

The Health Information Protection Act (HIPA) Founding Principles

Pharmacy professionals should be aware of the founding principles of HIPA (<u>The Health Information</u> <u>Protection Act, SS 1999, c H-0.021</u>) which apply to all personal health information:

- 1. Personal health information is private and shall be dealt with in a manner that respects the continuing interests of the individuals to whom it relates;
- 2. Individuals provide personal health information with the expectation of confidentiality and personal privacy;
- 3. Trustees of personal health information shall protect the confidentiality of the information and the privacy of the individuals to whom it relates;
- 4. The primary purpose of the collection, use and disclosure of personal health information is to benefit the individuals to whom it relates;
- 5. Wherever possible, the collection, use and disclosure of personal health information shall occur with the consent of the individuals to whom it relates;
- 6. Personal health information is essential to the provision of health services;
- 7. Wherever possible, personal health information shall be collected directly from the individual to whom it relates;
- 8. Personal health information shall be collected on a need-to-know basis;
- 9. Individuals shall be able to obtain access to records of their personal health information;
- 10. The security, accuracy and integrity of personal health information shall be protected;
- 11. Trustees shall be accountable to individuals with respect to the collection, use, disclosure and exercise of custody and control of personal health information;
- 12. Trustees shall be open about policies and practices with respect to the collection, use and disclosure of personal health information.
